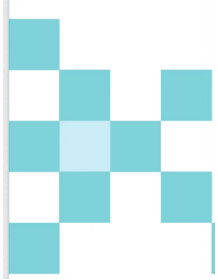

Research interests are on the intersection of three lines of study:

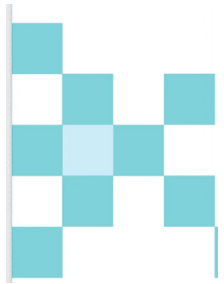
- a) the impact of the articulation between individual factors (values and attitudes) and social structures on the development of discriminatory attitudes and prejudice, in a multilevel perspective

PhD in Social Psychology

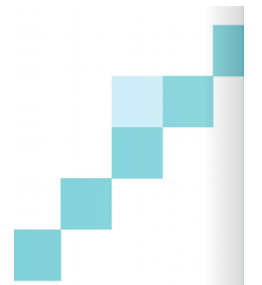
Applies social psychological theories and novel methodologies (including virtual reality and physiological measures) to investigate both the mechanisms behind discriminatory behaviour and the psychological consequences for those targeted by systemic bias.

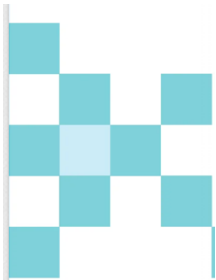
Adopts a cross-cultural perspective, simultaneously examining both the *oppressor* perspective (investigating the psychosocial mechanisms of negative attitudes and discriminatory behaviours) and the *oppressed* perspective, exploring how systemic biases affect the mental health of minoritized individuals.

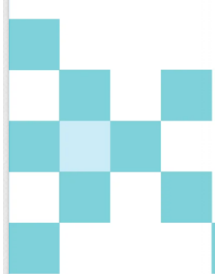


Contemporary Themes: Citizenship

Investigating socio-political transformations as they impinge on the quality and performance of European democracies. It focuses on three main topics:

- a) Citizenship Rights and Political Equality: Studying conflicts around citizenship rights;
- b) Participation and Representation: Examining the relationship between citizens' political attitudes and behaviours and institutional responsiveness;
- c) Governance: Studying government effectiveness and impartiality.

Citizenship offers an interdisciplinary space to address current challenges related to the multiple dimensions of citizenship in a democratic society. It brings together contributions from ICS research groups (RG)

Social and Political Attitudes: Resilience and Change

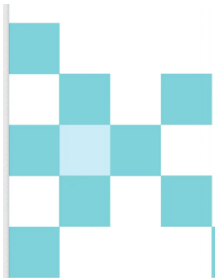
This RG explores two major themes: the study of identities and social differences, particularly intergroup inequalities and negative attitudes and behaviour towards low status groups; and determinants of political attitudes and behaviour, including the comparative study of their economic and institutional determinants, the Europeanization of politics, media and campaign personalization, and attitudes towards regimes and institutions.

RIGoP

The Research Group on Regimes, Institutions, Governance and Policies (RIGoP) conducts theoretical and empirical research on the regulation and governance of society via subnational, national and supranational institutions.



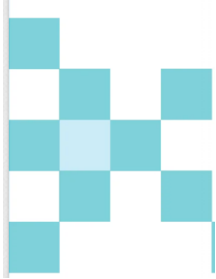


Contemporary Themes: Inclusion & Vulnerabilities

Develops policy debates and comprehensive sociological and ethnographic approaches to families, age cohorts, intergenerational relationships, social and cultural minorities, and the management of social conflict and tensions, examining a wide range of social inequalities and exposing multiple forms of vulnerability.

Inclusion and Vulnerabilities offers an interdisciplinary space to address and discuss research processes and action-research related to inclusion issues, policies, and strategies for tackling situations of vulnerability. It provides insights into the RGs

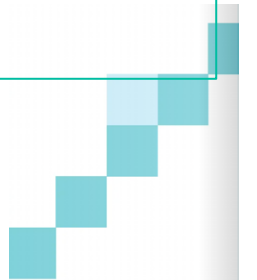

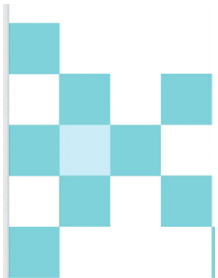

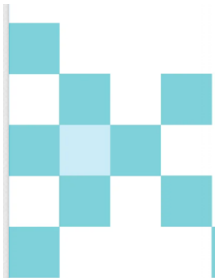
Life Course, Inequality and Solidarity: Practices and Policies

The central goal of this RG is to get to know how old and new forms of inequality and solidarity are (re)produced in a global society that is experiencing ever-faster change, and to understand their impacts on individuals' biographical pathways, lifestyles and daily lives.

The RG focus on contemporary tensions and challenges to social and personal vulnerabilities, in multiple sociocultural, economic and political contexts, namely labour, racialisation, territorialities, migration, health, urban and environment studies as key future-oriented issues. We develop empirical, mostly ethnographic research in multiple settings, in Portuguese-speaking countries



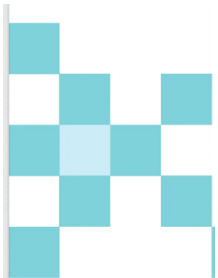

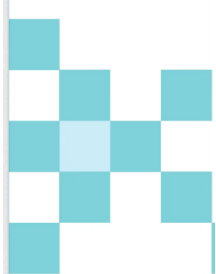




Contemporary Themes: Memory & Legacies

The study of contemporary societies involves the combined understanding of the historicity of social processes and of the presence of the past in everyday themes. Some of those themes have been brought to public attention with emphasis, others have remained under scholarly scrutiny; they include, among others, the legacies of enslavement, indenture, and plantation economies; racisms and nationalisms; colonialism, empires and diasporas; narratives of identity, culture, and memory; urban displacements and social movements; etc. Although much of our research has focused on Lusophone contexts, our purpose is to go beyond that universe of reference and participate in global debates and current scholarship.

Provides an interdisciplinary space for an approach to the historicity of social processes and the presence of the past in many of today's social issues, combining quantitative and qualitative methods, both immediate ethnographic and archival: Socioeconomic structures and inequalities; Governance of diversity; Cultural production, imaginaries, and conceptual formations; Material and immaterial mediation of memories and legacies; Archives, collections, memory management, and possible futures

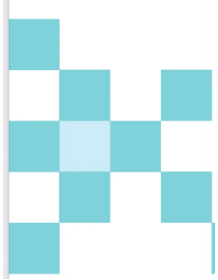
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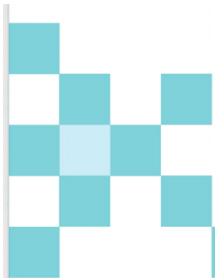

Empires, Colonialism and Post-colonial Societies

This RG researches the past and present significance of imperial and colonial formations in the Portuguese-speaking world. It adopts a critical, comparative, and long-term perspective in the study of the Portuguese Empire and its legacies in Lusophone countries and beyond. EMPIRES is distinctive for its cross-disciplinary combination of History and Anthropology, historiography and ethnographic theory.

Mem-Hist Memory, History and Society

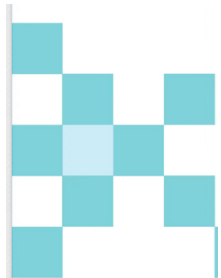
The main objective of this RG is to study social, economic, political and institutional changes in the contemporary world from a historical perspective. The research outcomes of the members of this RG emphasise the Portuguese case and the close relationship between Portugal and the countries with strong historical connections, taking into account their belonging to a global world.



Contemporary Themes: Sustainability

Sustainability is a key area of ICS-ULisboa's current and future research, and a strong pillar of its teaching, policy co-development and outreach work. It embraces inter/trans-disciplinary research to explore the theory and practice of sustainability, examining its past, present and future dynamics, to understand the complex roots of (un)sustainability and current inertia, and shaping sustainable futures, focusing on Latin America, Europe, Africa and Asia.

Sustainability will be multidisciplinary, multidimensional, and also multi-scalar, reflecting the global, national, and local challenges currently facing the topic. Students will be exposed to research conducted on sustainability practices in governance and democracy; public policies on the environment, climate, and nature conservation; as well as in relation to the behaviours and attitudes of socially differentiated groups, and transformative processes at the level of household habits and consumption.
